Hosemann, Davis spar over abortion issue

JACKSON (AP) — Fourth Congressional District candidate Delbert Hosemann has received endorsements from national and state anti-abortion groups despite claims by his opponent that he was associated with an abortion clinic.

Friday's endorsements came one day after Phil Davis began running television ads that question Hosemann's stance on abortion and say he has been an officer for the South Jackson Women's Clinic, where abortions have been performed.

Next week, Republicans in the 4th District will decide between Davis, a banker, and Hosemann, a lawyer, in a primary runoff.

Davis, who released paperwork about Hosemann's alleged connection to the clinic, said "candidates are people who live in glass houses, (and) I believe the role of the campaign is to clean the glass."

"His dirty politics and sleazy campaign tactics know absolutely no bounds," responded Hose-mann, who said he did legal work for the South Jackson Women's Clinic before abortions were per-

Mississippi Right to Life leader Sandy Ellard of Kosciusko said her group and the national Right to Life organization investigated the claims and determined they were baseless before making the

endorsements.

Hosemann said he was hired in the late 1970s for the Jackson gynecology clinic when it was embroiled in a dispute with the IRS. He said that he had nothing to do with the clinic after 1981.

His name was not removed from clinic documents filed with the secretary of state's office until 1989, according to records released by the Davis

says.
"He knew this was an absolute lie," said Hose-

Ellard said Hosemann, a Catholic, was endorsed after a review of questionnaires filled out by both candidates. She said the endorsement was also prompted in part by politics involving "unborn children."

"You'd like for that to be an issue off-bounds for politics. Unfortunately, it's been chosen to be kicked around in this race," she said.

The National Right to Life endorsement said that the group believes that Hosemann's election to Congress "will be one more step toward that day when the sanctity of human life will be restored in America."

Meanwhile, Davis was joined at a Friday news con-

ference by Dave Barlow, Jackson coordinator for Promise Keepers, an evangelical organization for men. Barlow said Davis has a record for "standing up and fighting for" moral causes.

The two candidates were debating Friday in Jackson and have another appearance together Monday in Jackson.

The winner faces Democrat Ronnie Shows and three other minor party candidates in November.
